Special Medical Needs Shelter (SMNS) Team

It took longer than expected but special medical needs planning and training is coming to CNY! We are forming a SMNS team consisting of health department personnel from our partner counties and CNYMRC volunteers, both medical and support. Special medical needs personnel take care of those clients in a mass care shelter that need medical assistance but do not warrant admission to an already overtaxed hospital or long term care facility. Medical needs may include diabetes, wound care, drug administration, ostomy care, and psychological first aid. While the medical side seems obvious, support may not. Support volunteers are also needed on this team to assist with tasks such as paperwork, client mobility, communications, and security.

To be a member of the SMNS team, you must complete the CNYMRC required training courses. Team members should also complete online training for IS-200 and cultural competency as well as attend the American Red Cross Mass Care Shelter Fundamentals course (Saturday February 8), SMNS training (Saturday March 1), and a SMNS tabletop exercise (Saturday May 3). Links and schedule information are in the Calendar of Events.

SMNS Team Update

The Special Medical Needs Shelter team started the training component of this project this winter. CNYMRC volunteers and local health department personnel attended an American Red Cross Shelter Fundamentals course to learn about when and how the Red Cross opens and operates mass care shelters. The team then worked on SMNS operations at our next training. Our counties discussed priority areas in developing an SMNS plan, what operations may look like for each county based on their capabilities, and analyzing obstacles we may face in planning. For example, if staffing is a major concern a county may find it easier to refer clients to facilities that are better equipped to care for the clients rather than trying to staff a shelter. If a referral center is a better plan, the county would need to work out these partnerships in advance of a disaster.

Our next activity is a tabletop exercise working through different client scenarios in shelter operations. A variety of partners are being invited to the exercise so we can build toward effective planning in each of our counties. The exercise is open to all CNYMRC volunteers.

Happy Summer! I wanted to take this time to bring you up-to-date on my activities related to the Medical Reserve Corps as on organization.

Last fall, the CNYMRC was fortunate to receive an award from NACCHO (National Association of City and County Health Officials) to create guidance and resource documents related to Unit Administration. This work was submitted and is currently being reviewed by NACCHO and the DCVMRC (Division of the Civilian Volunteer Medical Reserve Corps, our national office) for use in Factors For Success and NACCHO University. I will keep you posted on what resources are chosen for national dissemination.

I have been part of NACCHO's MRC Workgroup for the last three years and its chairperson for the last two. The workgroup collaborates with NACCHO and the DCVMRC to increase the national visibility of the MRC program and to enhance the capacity of local MRC units to support their communities' disaster preparedness and public health initiatives. The workgroup has also developed resources and guidance materials for Factors for Success. I advised on and am very excited about *MRC Connect*. *MRC Connect* is a web and mobile-based application to connect MRC leaders, allowing them to easily discuss many topics related to our work. We are also able to create a community for unit volunteers, connecting you to each other and serving as a repository for your comments and photos of CNYMRC activities. *MRC Connect* is rolling out this summer for unit leaders. Stay tuned for when the CNYMRC creates its own online community!

Our health departments and the CNYMRC recently trained on planning for special medical needs sheltering (SMNS). Planning is now in the hands of the individual counties. Part of the planning for some counties is finding out what resources may be available as an alternative to opening a shelter. I am looking for training related to actual shelter operations for volunteers--such as understanding cultural, physical and mental competencies; mobility assistance; and mental health. If you have ideas or connections to resources, please let me know.

Madison County Providing Liability Protections

The Madison County Health Department has recently been able to confirm that Madison County offers defense and indemnification protections for volunteers through the county's adoption of Public Officer Law § 18 (POL § 18). This confirmation allows the Madison County Health Department to utilize the CNYMRC for non-disaster event activities such as seasonal influenza vaccination clinics and drills and exercises.

Volunteer liability protections are currently offered by Cayuga, Cortland, Jefferson, Madison, and Onondaga Counties for all activities the CNYMRC is requested for. Volunteer liability protections are offered in all counties during a declared emergency for response and recovery activities.

Plan for older adults who may be living with you or are at a care facility--how do you stay in touch if there's an emergency? One more thing to plan--what would you and your family do if you are requested by the CNYMRC to deploy to a disaster operation?

It's best to work on your emergency plans in advance of something happening. This way everyone knows what to do.

Growing Concerns About Ebola, Enterovirus

In recent months. Ebola Virus Disease has made headlines of news sources everywhere. While cases of Ebola have not occurred in the United States, there is a growing concern amongst health care providers about how to manage the disease should cases occur here. The CDC has a wealth of information including disease information, where outbreaks have occurred, and the latest updates. Click HERE for CDC information on Ebola.

Cases of Enterovirus D68 (EV-D68) popped up throughout the mid-west United States this summer. It has now made its way here to central New York. EV-D68 is a non-polio enterovirus, causing mild to severe respiratory illness. The virus appears to be affecting children especially those with asthma. EV-D68 was first identified in 1962. Click HERE for CDC information on EV-D68.

In mid September, Upstate University Hospital/Golisano Children's Hospital requested the aid of the CNYMRC to assist the hospital with the surge of pediatric patients coming to the emergency department and being admitted for respiratory illnesses. As of September 30, Enterovirus D68 has seen a down swing locally, with less pediatric patients seen at emergency departments and admitted to hospitals.

Coordinator's Note: In light of the recent down swing in pediatric respiratory cases, the CNYMRC is lowering its activation level as we wait to see if cases continue to drop. CNYMRC members who had planned to assist with the response should continue the required predeployment paperwork so that we are ready if there is resurgence of the virus.

In spite of no deployment at this time, the CNYMRC and Upstate University Hospital were given a unique opportunity. There are very few medical reserve corps units that have deployed to a hospital and those who have are typically responding to a widespread natural disaster.

CNYMRC Recruitment

The CNYMRC continuously recruits new volunteers to the unit. Recruitment is necessary to keep the unit at a level that is needed for disaster response. Volunteers move, leave the unit, or have changes in their lives that affect involvement.

Changes have been made to print materials such as the recruitment brochure and flyer. These materials are available to members for use at their discretion at the <u>CNYMRC web site</u>. These materials are being made available to each of the county health departments for their individual use.

Presentations are an in-person way that the CNYMRC can reach potential volunteers. Ithaca College's Community Health class learned about the CNYMRC in September. Another presentation will be done for a nursing class at Cayuga Community College in October. If you have access to a class or to a professional organization meeting and would like to schedule a presentation, contact the CNYMRC Coordinator.

On occasion, the CNYMRC is present at events for recruitment purposes. This works better when it is a targeted group of attendees. An example would be a day-long professional development day with booths to visit during breaks.

CNYMRC in the Community

CNYMRC activities during July-September include:
