Re: Proposed Legislation

Dear Chair Rowley:

As you are aware, Onondaga County has been on the frontline in responding to the needs of this community during the Covid-19 public health crisis.

In support of the pandemic response, Resolution No. 157-2020 adopted by the County Legislature on December 3, 2020, contained language in its 11<sup>th</sup> Resolved clause read as providing the County Executive with authority to appropriate certain funds without obtaining additional specific authorization from the County Legislature, subject to the approval process set forth in the Resolution.

The purpose of this provision was to facilitate the County's response to the public health crisis posed by the COVID pandemic and provide the Administration with the flexibility to meet the uncertainties and needs confronting the County in responding to and recovering from the pandemic.

As you are aware, the County has used these funds to establish the Veteran's Initiative program, offer needed Mental Health services to all schools in the county, supply Broadband services to areas desperately in need, provide for a new Catholic Charities Shelter for men, expand County Neighborhood Initiatives, make needed improvements to our Roads and Bridges, update critical Infrastructure and Maintenance equipment for highways and parks, and fund important Workforce Development initiatives. These projects play a significant role in the County's pandemic response and recovery.

On August 3, 2021, the County Legislature by Resolution No. 81-2021, amended Resolution No. 157-2020 to "strike the 11<sup>th</sup> Resolved Clause effective immediately". The County Attorney interpreted Resolution No. 81-2021 to not be retroactive.

You and other members of the County Legislature have questioned whether Resolution No. 157-2020 is consistent with County Charter provisions regarding "the separation of County Legislative and Executive functions."

While Resolution No. 157-2020 was part of a joint effort by which the County Administration and the County Legislature have been meeting the public health crisis in all its dimensions, I recognize your concern that our cooperative actions should comport with County Charter principles of separation of powers, and at all times legal precedent is important in maintaining the balance of powers established within the County Charter and Code

In the spirit of that cooperation and to expressly address your concerns regarding the significance and potential implications for section 607 of the County Charter, I am forwarding for the County Legislature's consideration a proposed resolution regarding the appropriation of revenues made pursuant to Resolution No. 157-2020.

# Legislature - Preface

Before I begin I would like to say my original writings on Syracuse Jazz fest was much longer, but I cut it and spent days trying to boil it down to what I hoped would be some essentials. I learned last night that this money is aimed at Tourism. I have followed and tried to assess such tourism efforts as the local Indian fort, Gifford Zoo, the Route 20 trail endeavor, the Elevate Erie project. What are the final results and outcomes. What I am trying to say its easy to fall back on what has been done in the past rather than look at a fuller scope of possibilities. Two cautions. First, grant seekers know what buzz words to use such as "under served", but maybe this misses a larger audience. Second, everything can be counted and assessed with an eye towards judging effectiveness. Once working in a capacity with the federal government, they didn't like the numbers, which were close to zero, their answer, change how you count the numbers. This was sort of like my room mate during the Vietnam war. They asked him if he had ever seen a psychiatrist. He reasoned that while he hadn't done so personally, he had walked around in major cities so he must have seen a psychoatrist, so he answered yes and it kept him out of the Vietnam war. He went on to write books used in most colleges. Personally, I think people come to Jazzfest and may buy from food trucks, but then they go home. Regardless, if you do fund this, I will offer you some ideas on how you might more accurately assess the quote "impact". I estimate it may cost up to \$10,000, of which I will receive nothing.

I will now read my formal remarks into the record.

# Regarding Money for Syracuse Jazz Fest

My name is Peter Svoboda. My plea here today is based on a background in business, education, being involved in millions of dollars in grant funding, and from many years of study of history and culture.

I should note that I am President of a 501 c3 charitable organization, Pinnacle International Center with an office located in Syracuse, whose main and written goal is to Build a Better Culture. I repeat our main goal is to Build a Better Culture.

I am asking you to either vote no or table the money for Syracuse Jazz Fest.

Back in September I challenged Mr. Malfitano to a debate in a hope to create an educational forum where he, Mr. Luttinger, and others could state their case for funding. He refused my offer.

My main goal in putting for this challenge was to create a forum, better yet a series of public debates, to educate the public and elected officials, and raise awareness on new thinking of how money could be better spent to really meet the needs of today. It is sad that our thinking and current institutional offerings are still based on viewpoints developed in the 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century. A survey of noted historians will find a consensus, defining today's culture as "decadent", in a state of endless repetition, when new thinking is really needed. Christopher Hedges, past Pulitzer prize winner for explanatory reporting points to how spectacle has replaced more meaningful and important ideas that formerly occupied our thinking. I could go on to other sources, but my time and space are limited.

I went back and read a very lengthy editorial (online only, link listed at end) by Mr. Malfitano that at first blush seems to make a pretty good argument, but on closer examination, it all falls away. And while Frank states his administrative expenses are something like 6 percent, a look at the public filing 990, which is available for all to see, show the salary line is 111,000 with no further details as to

where it goes, so the admin line is more like 26 percent. Mind you, I don't care how much someone or someones are paid if they have the know how and what they do is worth it. Mr. Malfitano definitely has the background, know how, and passion. You can pay someone 10 million dollars a year for all I care. I am focusing on the long-term value of the event.

Back at the turn of the new millennium, year 2000, the first Monday, the Post Standard printed a piece I had written entitled, "Make Syracuse the City of Innovation". I received exactly 30 phone calls from very solid citizens despite the fact that my cell number was not printed. But what was more astounding was I discovered a few weeks later, that local government officials, the city, the county, and entrenched recognized organizations had called a meeting to see if they could come up with a meaningful way to define Syracuse and attract attention to our region. They never called me for any further information. It's a closed system. After the meeting, they just walked away agreeing that no definition was better. We could have been the Big Apple of something, but that would have required hard, new and courageous thinking. Best not to disturb sacred cows. They chose nothing. We are defined as an average city.

I believe Mr. Malfitano also suggested the painting of a several story basketball player on one of our downtown buildings. I am not a sports enthusiast, but I would have been in favor of this. At least that would have been something striking and memorable and consistent with the only thing we are known for — home of the dome. Perhaps it was because a painter from California was chosen, or more likely because of political correctness, that money has now been ferreted into a black hole where different groups will create pieces that will satisfy their outcry, but the real impact will be nil. Once again, political forces gave in to the lowest common denominator. It's not leadership. Give us Barabas.

Malfitano's strongest argument is that we might be known for something. He has a point there, so if you want our region to be defined that way, if you think that when people hear the word Syracuse or central New York they will say, "Oh, that's where the Syracuse Jazzfest is", and that will have some long-term effect on our region, then maybe you should vote for it. The Jazzfest has gone on for 35

years, but aside from being a free musical event, there are no long-term benefits that I can see. And that is what I am questioning here.

Or maybe you will vote for it so that you can give a population a one or two day stand of free entertainment. As I have said previously, I feel about Jazz Fest the same way I feel about giving everyone in Onondaga County free pizza next Tuesday. Everyone will feel good about it for a day but there will be no long-term effect. And many, many people believe as I do, that the money could be better spent somewhere else.

I have had two guest editorials in the Post Standard proposing a new type of community center to serve all of Onondaga County. It should be in a mall, because a mall already has an audience. It should be networked with all the schools, and open to anyone. Comprised of a gallery of creations by local people, with a few open studios where people could be helped in furtherance of their visions, a cafe where famous films would be constantly running, and a used bookstore. An enriched environment where people would be able to meet, create, and launch new visions. You just might be surprised about what small groups of people can accomplish if you give them the opportunity and place. Let's call it the Central New York Visioning Center. Now that is something that maybe worthy of being known for, something that people and community leaders from other areas might come here to see. Or let's become a County of Scholarship. Try for something new.

But I am not here not to ask for funding. I am writing all this because I wish to do something for the common good of the public, not for any private benefit. When it comes to the arts, everything needs to be given another look. About 8 years ago,, Syracuse University brought Maria Rosario Jackson to speak about the results of her arts research, her main recommendation was that money should be funneled away from organizations and given to artists. Just recently, 3 private foundations have come up with \$80 million dollars to be allotted to artists in New York. It's a step in the right direction, but not even close to what is really needed to create a vibrant culture. It's the regular citizens that need to be focused on.

I am here today in hopes of trying to get us to do much better in really taking a close look at what is being done and further the discussion of possibilities.

Let others come forward with other proposals. And let's see if we can get an ongoing discussion or series of debates going about where public money should be spent.

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Until that is done, I would ask that the legislator either deny or table the money for Syracuse Jazz Fest. Chances are most of us will be alive next year and that will give us time to take a better and closer look at this and other possibilities.

#### BOND RESOLUTION

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING IMPROVEMENTS TO THE ARMY RESERVE CENTER FOR USE AS AN EMERGENCY OPERATIONS CENTER IN AND FOR THE COUNTY OF ONONDAGA, NEW YORK, AT A MAXIMUM ESTIMATED COST OF \$1,100,000, AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$1,100,000 BONDS OF SAID COUNTY TO PAY COSTS THEREOF

BE IT RESOLVED, by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the total voting strength of the County Legislature of the County of Onondaga, New York, as follows:

- Section 1. Improvements to the Army Reserve Center required for its use as an Emergency Operations Center, including incidental costs in connection therewith, are hereby authorized at an estimated maximum cost of \$1,100,000.
- Section 2. The plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$1,100,000 bonds of said County, hereby authorized to be issued therefor pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law.
- Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is twenty-five years pursuant to subdivision 12(a)(1) of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.
- Section 4. The faith and credit of said County of Onondaga, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds becoming due and payable in such year. To the extent not available from other sources, there shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same become due and payable.
- Section 5. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Chief Fiscal Officer of such County. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Chief Fiscal Officer, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.
- Section 6. All other matters except as provided herein relating to the bonds herein authorized including the date, denominations, maturities and interest payment dates, within the limitations prescribed herein and the manner of execution of the same, including the consolidation with other issues, and also the ability to issue bonds with substantially level or declining annual debt service, shall be determined by the Chief Fiscal Officer, the chief fiscal officer of such County. Such bonds shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals, in addition to those required by Section 51.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Chief Fiscal Officer shall determine consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

<u>Section 7.</u> The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes may be contested only if:

- 1) Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) The provisions of law which should be complied with the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or
- 3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 8. The County Executive is authorized to enter into contracts to implement the intent of this resolution. In the event that General Fund Operating Surplus Funds are available at the end of the fiscal year, and if the Chief Fiscal Officer of Onondaga County deems it fiscally advantageous to use surplus funds rather than borrowing, all or a portion of the cost of the improvements authorized herein shall be paid using such surplus funds. Further, in the event that General Fund Operating Surplus Funds are so utilized, then the authorization to issue bonds provided within this resolution is hereby rescinded accordingly, reduced by the amount of funds utilized.

Section 9. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Treasury Regulations Section 1.150-2. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the object or purpose described herein.

Section 10. This resolution, which takes effect immediately, shall be published in summary form in the Syracuse Post Standard, the official newspaper of said County, together with a notice of the Clerk of the County Legislature in substantially the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

# REFUNDING BOND RESOLUTION DATED MARCH 1, 2022

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE PURSUANT TO SECTION 90.10 OF THE LOCAL FINANCE LAW OF REFUNDING BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF ONONDAGA, NEW YORK, TO BE DESIGNATED SUBSTANTIALLY "PUBLIC IMPROVEMENT REFUNDING (SERIAL) BONDS", AND PROVIDING FOR OTHER MATTERS IN RELATION THERETO AND THE PAYMENT OF THE BONDS TO BE REFUNDED THEREBY

WHEREAS, the County of Onondaga, New York (hereinafter, the "County") heretofore issued:

- (i) \$20,615,000 General Obligation Refunding (Serial) Bonds, 2012 pursuant to a bond determination certificate dated on or before July 11, 2012 (the "2012 Bond Certificate") to refund all or a portion of the outstanding principal balance of the General Obligation (Serial) Bonds, 2003 Series A dated July 15, 2003 and all or a portion of the outstanding principal balance of the General Obligation (Serial) Bonds, 2004 Series A dated August 15, 2004 for said County as further described in the 2012 Bond Certificate, such General Obligation Refunding (Serial) Bonds, 2012, being dated July 11, 2012 with remaining maturities on February 15 in each of the years 2023 through 2025, both inclusive (the "2012 Bonds"); and
- (ii) \$34,800,000 General Obligation (Serial) Bonds, 2014 pursuant to a bond determination certificate dated on or before June 27, 2014 (the "2014 Bond Certificate") to finance the cost of various purposes in and for said County as further described in the 2014 Bond Certificate, such General Obligation (Serial) Bonds, 2014, being dated June 27, 2014 with remaining maturities on May 1 in each of the years 2023 through 2034, both inclusive (the "2014 Bonds") (collectively, the "Refunded Bonds"); and

WHEREAS, it would be in the public interest to refund all or a portion of the remaining outstanding callable principal balance of the Refunded Bonds by the issuance of refunding bonds pursuant to Section 90.00 or Section 90.10, as applicable of the Local Finance Law; and

WHEREAS, such refunding will only be undertaken if it results in present value savings in debt service as required by Section 90.10 of the Local Finance Law; now, therefore be it

RESOLVED, by the County Legislature of the County of Onondaga, New York, as follows:

Section 1. For the object or purpose of refunding the outstanding callable principal balance of the Refunded Bonds as more fully set forth in the Refunding Financial Plan (hereinafter defined), including providing moneys which, together with the interest earned from the investment of certain of the proceeds of the refunding bonds herein authorized, shall be sufficient to pay (i) the principal amount of such Refunded Bonds, (ii) the aggregate amount of unmatured interest payable on such Refunded Bonds to and including the date on which the Refunded Bonds which are callable are to be called prior to their respective maturities in accordance with the refunding financial plan, as hereinafter defined, (iii) the costs and expenses incidental to the issuance of the refunding bonds herein authorized, including the development of the refunding financial plan, as hereinafter defined, costs and expenses of executing and performing the terms and conditions of the escrow contract or contracts, as hereinafter defined, and fees and charges of the escrow holder or holders, as hereinafter mentioned, (iv) the premium or premiums for a policy or policies of municipal bond insurance or cost or costs of other credit enhancement facility or facilities, for the refunding bonds herein authorized, or any portion thereof, there are hereby authorized to be issued not exceeding \$19,000,000 refunding serial bonds of the County pursuant to the provisions of Section 90.10 of the Local Finance Law (the "Refunding Bonds"), it being anticipated that the amount of Refunding Bonds actually to be issued will be approximately \$15,985,000, as provided in Section 4 hereof. The Refunding

Bonds shall each be designated substantially "PUBLIC IMPROVEMENT REFUNDING (SERIAL) BOND" together with such series designation and year as is appropriate on the date of sale thereof, shall be of the denomination of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof (except for any odd denominations, if necessary) not exceeding the principal amount of each respective maturity, shall be numbered with the prefix "R" followed by a dash and then from 1 upward, shall be dated on such dates, and shall mature annually on such dates in such years, bearing interest semi-annually on such dates, at the rate or rates of interest per annum, as may be necessary to sell the same, all as shall be determined by the Chief Fiscal Officer pursuant to Section 4 hereof. It is hereby further determined that (a) such Refunding Bonds may be issued in series, (b) such Refunding Bonds may be sold at a discount in the manner authorized by paragraph a of Section 57.00 of the Local Finance Law pursuant to subdivision 2 of paragraph f of Section 90.10 of the Local Finance Law, and (c) such Refunding Bonds may be issued as a single consolidated issue. It is hereby further determined that such Refunding Bonds may be issued to refund all, or any portion of, the Refunded Bonds, subject to approval by the State Comptroller.

Section 2. The Refunding Bonds may be subject to redemption prior to maturity upon such terms as the Chief Fiscal Officer shall prescribe, which terms shall be in compliance with the requirements of Section 53.00 (b) of the Local Finance Law. If less than all of the Refunding Bonds of any maturity are to be redeemed, the particular refunding bonds of such maturity to be redeemed shall be selected by the County by lot in any customary manner of selection as determined by the Chief Fiscal Officer. Notice of such call for redemption shall be given by providing notice to the registered owners not less than thirty (30) days prior to such date. Notice of redemption having been given as aforesaid, the bonds so called for redemption shall, on the date for redemption set forth in such call for redemption, become due and payable, together with interest to such redemption date, and interest shall cease to be paid thereon after such redemption date.

The Refunding Bonds shall be issued in registered form and shall not be registrable to bearer or convertible into bearer coupon form. When issued, the Refunding Bonds shall be initially issued in denominations such that one bond shall be issued for each maturity of bonds and shall be registered in the name of Cede & Co., as nominee of The Depository Trust Company, Jersey City, New Jersey ("DTC"), which will act as securities depository for the bonds in accordance with the Book-Entry-Only system of DTC. In the event that either DTC shall discontinue the Book-Entry-Only system or the County shall terminate its participation in such Book-Entry-Only system, such bonds shall thereafter be issued in certificated form of the denomination of \$5,000 each or any integral multiple thereof (except for any odd denominations, if necessary) not exceeding the principal amount of each respective maturity. Principal of and interest on the bonds shall be payable to DTC, or to its nominee, Cede & Co., while the bonds are registered in the name of Cede & Co. in accordance with such Book-Entry-Only System. Principal shall only be payable upon surrender of the bonds at the principal corporate trust office of the Chief Fiscal Officer.

In the event said Refunding Bonds are issued in non-book entry form, principal of and interest on the Refunding Bonds shall be payable by check or draft mailed by the Fiscal Agent (as hereinafter defined) to the registered owners of the Refunding Bonds as shown on the registration books of the County maintained by the Fiscal Agent (as hereinafter defined), as of the close of business on the fifteenth day of the calendar month or first business day of the calendar month preceding each interest payment date as appropriate and as provided in a certificate of the Chief Fiscal Officer providing for the details of the Refunding Bonds. Principal shall only be payable upon surrender of bonds at the principal corporate trust office of a bank or trust company or banks or trust companies located or authorized to do business in the State of New York, as shall hereafter be designated by the Chief Fiscal Officer as fiscal agent of the County for the Refunding Bonds (collectively the "Fiscal Agent").

Principal and interest on the Refunding Bonds will be payable in lawful money of the United States of America.

The Chief Fiscal Officer is hereby authorized to enter into an agreement or agreements containing such terms and conditions as he shall deem proper with the Fiscal Agent, for the purpose of having such bank or trust company or banks or trust companies act, in connection with the Refunding Bonds, as the Fiscal Agent for said County, to perform the services described in Section 70.00 of the Local Finance Law, and to execute such agreement or agreements on behalf of the County, regardless of whether the Refunding Bonds are initially issued in certificated or non-certificated form.

The Chief Fiscal Officer is hereby further delegated all powers of this County Legislature with respect to agreements for credit enhancement, derived from and pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, for said Refunding Bonds, including, but not limited to the determination of the provider of such credit enhancement facility or facilities and the terms and contents of any agreement or agreements related thereto.

The Refunding Bonds shall be executed in the name of the County by the manual signature of the Chief Fiscal Officer, and its corporate seal shall be imprinted thereon. The Refunding Bonds shall contain the recital required by subdivision 4 of paragraph j of Section 90.10 of the Local Finance Law and the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals, in addition to those required by Section 51.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Chief Fiscal Officer shall determine. It is hereby determined that it is to the financial advantage of the County not to impose and collect from registered owners of the Refunding Bonds any charges for mailing, shipping and insuring bonds transferred or exchanged by the Fiscal Agent, and, accordingly, pursuant to paragraph c of Section 70.00 of the Local Finance Law, no such charges shall be so collected by the Fiscal Agent.

## Section 3. It is hereby determined that:

- the maximum amount of the Refunding Bonds authorized to be issued pursuant to this resolution does not exceed the limitation imposed by subdivision 1 of paragraph b of Section 90.10 of the Local Finance Law;
- (b) the maximum period of probable usefulness permitted by law at the time of the issuance of the Refunded Bonds for each object or purpose for which such Refunded Bonds were issued is as specified in the 2012 Bond Certificate and the 2014 Bond Certificate which are incorporated herein by reference;
- (c) the last installment of the Refunding Bonds will mature not later than the expiration of the respective period of probable usefulness of the objects or purposes for which said Refunded Bonds were issued in accordance with the provisions of subdivision 1 of paragraph c of Section 90.10 of the Local Finance Law.
- (d) the estimated present value of the total debt service savings anticipated as a result of the issuance of the Refunding Bonds, computed in accordance with the provisions of subdivision 2 of paragraph b of Section 90.10 of the Local Finance Law, with regard to the Refunded Bonds is as shown in the Refunding Financial Plan described in Section 4 hereof.

Section 4. The financial plan for the refunding authorized by this resolution (the "Refunding Financial Plan"), showing the sources and amounts of all moneys required to accomplish such refunding, the estimated present value of the total debt service savings and the basis for the computation of the aforesaid estimated present value of total debt service savings, are set forth in Exhibit A attached hereto and made a part of this resolution. The Refunding Financial Plan has been prepared based upon the assumption that the Refunding Bonds will be issued in one series, and that the Refunding Bonds will mature, be of such terms, and bear interest as set forth on Exhibit A attached hereto and made a part of this resolution. This County Legislature recognizes that the Refunding Bonds may be issued in one or more

series, and for only portions thereof, that the amount of the Refunding Bonds, maturities, terms, and interest rate or rates borne by the Refunding Bonds to be issued by the County will most probably be different from such assumptions and that the Refunding Financial Plan will also most probably be different from that attached hereto as Exhibit A. The Chief Fiscal Officer is hereby authorized and directed to determine the amount of the Refunding Bonds to be issued, the date or dates of such bonds and the date or dates of issue, maturities and terms thereof, the provisions relating to the redemption of Refunding Bonds prior to maturity, whether the Refunding Bonds will be insured by a policy or policies of municipal bond insurance or otherwise enhanced by a credit enhancement facility or facilities, whether the Refunding Bonds shall be sold at a discount in the manner authorized by paragraph e of Section 57.00 of the Local Finance Law, and the rate or rates of interest to be borne thereby, whether the Refunding Bonds shall be issued having substantially level or declining annual debt service and all matters related thereto, and to prepare, or cause to be provided, a final Refunding Financial Plan for the Refunding Bonds and all powers in connection therewith are hereby delegated to the Chief Fiscal Officer; provided, that the terms of the Refunding Bonds to be issued, including the rate or rates of interest borne thereby, shall comply with the requirements of Section 90.10 of the Local Finance Law. The Chief Fiscal Officer shall file a copy of his certificate determining the details of the Refunding Bonds and the final Refunding Financial Plan with the Clerk of the County Legislature not later than ten (10) days after the delivery of the Refunding Bonds, as herein provided.

Section 5. The Chief Fiscal Officer is hereby authorized to enter into an escrow contract or contracts (collectively the "Escrow Contract") with a bank or trust company, or with banks or trust companies, located and authorized to do business in this State as said Chief Fiscal Officer shall designate (collectively the "Escrow Holder") for the purpose of having the Escrow Holder act, in connection with the Refunding Bonds, as the escrow holder to perform the services described in Section 90.10 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 6. The faith and credit of said County of Onondaga, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on the Refunding Bonds as the same become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds becoming due and payable in such year. There shall be annually levied on all the taxable real property in said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such Refunding Bonds as the same become due and payable.

Section 7. All of the proceeds from the sale of the Refunding Bonds, including the premium, if any, but excluding accrued interest thereon, shall immediately upon receipt thereof be placed in escrow with the Escrow Holder for the Refunded Bonds. Accrued interest on the Refunding Bonds shall be paid to the County to be expended to pay interest on the Refunding Bonds. Such proceeds as are deposited in the escrow deposit fund to be created and established pursuant to the Escrow Contract, whether in the form of cash or investments, or both, inclusive of any interest earned from the investment thereof, shall be irrevocably committed and pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on the Refunded Bonds in accordance with Section 90.10 of the Local Finance Law, and the holders, from time to time, of the Refunded Bonds shall have a lien upon such moneys held by the Escrow Holder. Such pledge and lien shall become valid and binding upon the issuance of the Refunding Bonds and the moneys and investments held by the Escrow Holder for the Refunded Bonds in the escrow deposit fund shall immediately be subject thereto without any further act. Such pledge and lien shall be valid and binding as against all parties having claims of any kind in tort, contract or otherwise against the County irrespective of whether such parties have notice thereof.

Section 8. Notwithstanding any other provision of this resolution, so long as any of the Refunding Bonds shall be outstanding, the County shall not use, or permit the use of, any proceeds from the sale of the Refunding Bonds in any manner which would cause the Refunding Bonds to be an "arbitrage bond" as defined in Section 148 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, and, to the extent applicable, the Regulations promulgated by the United States Treasury Department thereunder.

Section 9. In accordance with the provisions of Section 53.00 and of paragraph h of Section 90.10 of the Local Finance Law, in the event such bonds are refunded, the County hereby elects to call in and redeem each Refunded Bond which the Chief Fiscal Officer shall determine to be refunded at the earliest call date available. The sum to be paid therefor on such redemption date shall be the par value thereof plus the redemption premium, if any, as provided in the Refunded Bond Certificate, and the accrued interest to such redemption date. The Escrow Agent for the Refunding Bonds is hereby authorized and directed to cause notice of such call for redemption to be given in the name of the County in the manner and within the times provided in the Refunded Bond Certificate. Such notice of redemption shall be in substantially the form attached to the Escrow Contract. Upon the issuance of the Refunding Bonds, the election to call in and redeem the callable Refunded Bonds and the direction to the Escrow Agent to cause notice thereof to be given as provided in this paragraph shall become irrevocable, provided that this paragraph may be amended from time to time as may be necessary in order to comply with the publication requirements of paragraph a of Section 53.00 of the Local Finance Law, or any successor law thereto.

Section 10. The Chief Fiscal Officer and all other officers, employees and agents of the County are hereby authorized and directed for and on behalf of the County to execute and deliver all certificates and other documents, perform all acts and do all things required or contemplated to be executed, performed or done by this resolution or any document or agreement approved hereby.

Section 11. All other matters pertaining to the terms and issuance of the Refunding Bonds shall be determined by the Chief Fiscal Officer and all powers in connection thereof are hereby delegated to the Chief Fiscal Officer.

Section 12. The validity of the Refunding Bonds may be contested only if:

- 1. Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2. The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or
- 3. Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 13. A summary of this resolution, which takes effect immediately, shall be published in the official newspaper of said County, together with a notice of the Clerk of the Legislature in substantially the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

WHEREAS, on March 11, 2021, President Biden signed the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 into law intended to combat the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, part of the plan for federal recovery fiscal aid to state and local governments, is provided in direct aid to counties; and

WHEREAS, Onondaga County has been allocated and has collected the first tranche of the direct aid to counties totaling \$44,726,082; and

WHEREAS, New York State Workers' Compensation Board has provided a lump sum payment in the amount of \$16,499,032 to Onondaga County for workers' compensation claims under Section 15(8); and

WHEREAS, collectively, \$61,225,115 (project account 700900) was made available to support various projects and initiatives throughout Onondaga County; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution 57-2021 and 58-2021, the Onondaga County Legislature authorized the 2021 Highway Work Plan which included \$5,000,000 in cash from stimulus funding; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution 91-2021, the Onondaga County Legislature authorized a loan to the Onondaga County Industrial Development Agency for up to \$20,000,000 from stimulus funding to expand and improve asset development in Onondaga County; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution 114-2021, the Onondaga County Legislature authorized intermunicipal agreements for capital improvements to town and village facilities within Onondaga County for \$5,000,000 from stimulus funding; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution Local Law 7-2021, the Onondaga County Legislature authorized a \$2,000,000 revolving loan fund for programs of external repairs and improvements made on residential property within Onondaga County from stimulus funding; and

WHEREAS, the intent of this resolution is to confirm all funds designated under resolutions 57-2021, 58-2021, 91-2021, 114-2021 and local law 7-2021 are accordingly appropriated funds, and

WHEREAS, a balance of funds remains unassigned from these sources; now, therefore be it
